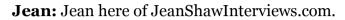
Barry Wells - (LearnWithSally student)



Today I'm talking to Barry Wells from Buckinghamshire in the UK who got into the internet marketing scene a few years ago, quite literally by accident.

Barry used to be a plumbers mate and then worked in the demolition business, which he thoroughly enjoyed

but a spinal injury meant he needed to make a serious career change.

So let's have a quick chat to Barry to learn about his journey from physical manual labour to becoming a successful online marketer.

Hi Barry, are you around?

Barry: Hello Jean.

Jean: How are you?

Barry: I'm not too bad thank you, and thanks for inviting me on the call today.

Jean: Okay, well I thought I needed to because I know you've been facing a lot of fears lately, but you've never actually done an interview have you?

Barry: I haven't - No. This is my first.

Jean: Oh right, well let's make it a good one then shall we?

Barry: Okay.

Jean: I promise I'll be very kind.

Barry: That's good.

Jean: So let's see now, is it fair to say that if you hadn't had your injury you may not of been online?

Barry: That is correct, yes.

Jean: So you didn't actually hate your job, which is why a lot of people decide that they want to be behind the computer rather than go off for a j.o.b?

Barry: I actually loved my job.

I used to work 6 days a week from 6 till 6 and I was pulling buildings down and it was an excellent job.

Jean: Were you able to reclaim any of the things you pulled down?

Barry: Yes, we did a lot of reclaiming. A lot went to scrap but half of the buildings would go to reclaim.

Jean: So do you have a lot in your house, as I know a lot of people do don't they? Collect things that people have thrown away?

Barry: No, I did in my previous houses, but through my disability I've had to downsize and move to adapted premises, and they're not as big as I'd like, so a lot of my old stuff has had to be disposed of.

Jean: That's a shame. So was Fred Dibnah one of your heroes?

Barry: He was yes.

Jean: He was a lovely guy wasn't he?

Barry: Yeah, true talent.

Jean: So let's see, you had your accident unfortunately and then you went selling books, is that right?

Barry: Yes, I went to the college to try and re-educate and I knew computers were the big thing so that's what I wanted to get into.

But unfortunately the college that I went to, the courses that I applied for didn't have enough applicants, so they didn't do that actual course.

So I then started selling books to schools and offices, but unfortunately my car blew up so I had a lot of stock that I had to dispose of.

Jean: So at that point how did you then discover the internet?

Barry: Well a friend of mine mentioned eBay and I'd never heard of eBay at the time, I'd never been on a computer.

So he told me about eBay, I went on to eBay and found that people were making a success there. So that's where I started.

Jean: So how long ago is this Barry?

Barry: Five years, six years now.

Jean: So still quite a relatively short period.

And you did a 36 week internet marketing course. Was that with John Thornhill?

Barry: It was - Yes. It was the Internet Marketing Master Class.

Jean: So, that sort of kick started your career then?

Barry: Yes, I started before that because when I was on eBay I found the 90 Day Power Seller eBook and I was intrigued.

As I bought it and it was instantly delivered to me, I was engrossed. I was really impressed and thought how did he do this?

So that was what started it, but for the first couple of years I was only really playing at it and once I took the Master Class course it opened my eyes, and I decided not to play with it anymore and let's start getting serious.

Jean: So you stopped learning and started earning then?

Barry: Sort of yeah.

Jean: It's always good to take a few courses isn't it, because people get across the same message, but in different ways and it doesn't always sink in the first time does it?

Barry: I find some courses; they cover different aspects of marketing.

The Master Class got me started in blogging and product creation and then sales page and affiliates, and that really got me started.

But there was still other areas that I needed to learn which I done through the Learn With Sally.

Jean: I noticed that in some of the videos that you've done you seemed to have a whiteboard in your kitchen. Is that how you plan out what you're going to do each day?

Barry: No, that's my year plan that is.

Jean: Your year plan, okay.

Barry: Yes, that's the year plan and I have a weekly list and a daily list.

Jean: So, do you break your year plan down into quarters and months before you get down to your weekly and daily, or not?

Barry: I haven't because what I'd done at the start of this year, I had all my plan and then my mother had a bleed to her brain.

She was in hospital for a few weeks and then a care home but she was diagnosed with vascular dementia.

So unfortunately the first 6 months of the year was spent assisting my mum, so I didn't actually start my plans.

And then I won the Learn With Sally and that's taken up the second part.

Jean: So how did you win the Learn With Sally?

Barry: Through commenting on her blog, and then her daughter Jade picked me out of the Daz box.

Jean: Right, okay. So you were presently surprised presumably?

Barry: Extremely, yeah. I was extremely surprised and very very grateful.

Jean: And you've been one of her star pupils, haven't you?

Do you think your success has been partly because you won the prize and you didn't want to let her down, or did her course come along at a point in your life when you were ready to move forward?

Barry: A bit of both there Jean, really.

Because I won the course I didn't want to let Sally down and I didn't want to let myself down either.

It was such a great opportunity that if I hadn't grasped it the way I did, then I felt I would have let both of us down.

Jean: And you won a camera, didn't you?

Barry: I did, yes, for the traffic generation.

Jean: Yes, fantastic that's really good. You've faced quite a few fears during the Learn With Sally course, one of which was speaking on a webinar and they asked what your biggest fear was and you said your wife.

Barry: Ha ha, yes, and I still get in trouble for that today.

Jean: Does your wife get involved with your online career?

Barry: No, she's got no interest in the internet at all.

She does support me and when I discuss things with her she is picking it up and she encourages me and assists in everything else.

She takes care of all the household duties and commitments while I'm working online.

Jean: That's fantastic. And what about your children because you've got 2 children I believe?

Barry: I have yes.

My son's just qualified as a plumber and my daughter she's currently working part time at a superstore.

She really did assist me with the computer side of things because with the first eBook I made, it was funny. I was doing a click by click demonstration of how to create a website.

I didn't know about the print screen facility, so I was literally printing part of the screen and then printing another part, sticking the papers together, scanning it and then bringing it into the eBook.

And my daughter came in and said "what are you doing dad?" as I was sticking these pages together.

I explained, and she smiled and hit the print screen button, then said "now go to your page and hit paste".

And it was there and she saved me about 3 months work.

Jean: This is it you see children are brought up with computers right from day one even at primary school now aren't they.

So if you don't know anything just ask your children or your grandchildren or even your great great grandchildren. Depending on how old you are.

Barry: Exactly.

Jean: So have they got any interest in maybe pursuing blogging themselves? Have they got their own blogs?

Barry: They haven't, No.

I was trying to encourage my daughter to do so, because she was studying as a sports physio in the college. The only thing that stopped her is now these university fees.

Jean: Yes, they're extortionate aren't they?

Well, maybe you could give her a blog for Christmas and then she could earn enough money to pay for it herself, eventually.

Barry: That would be a good idea.

Jean: It would solve your Christmas present problem as well anyway.

Barry: Yeah.

Jean: You talk about writing your first eBook, but I see that you also do Kindle books now as well.

Yes, what I'd done with the Kindle...

I wanted to review a product and I think the only way to truly review a product is to purchase it, and follow each and every step which I did with the Kindle Publishing Made Easy.

So I done that and I followed it through and it was only a plr product that I used, but I re-worded the plr product, included my links and changed the graphics and uploaded that to Kindle.

But that was purely just to review the product, but I will be creating Kindle products from every eBook that I now create.

Jean: That's really good, because a lot of people do that now don't they? They take plr, change it around a bit and stick it up on Kindle, and you can also do that with Nook as well can't you, and Google eBooks and things.

Do you think you'll ever create your own hard copy book on Create Space or Amazon?

Barry: I have thought about it, I've got a product that's coming up for launch fairly soon and I'm thinking of turning that into a paid print one.

Jean: You could write your story couldn't you. The Barry Wells story and include some of the things that you've done in that. That would be an interesting book.

Barry: Yes, I think it would.

Jean: Going back to Learn With Sally, what do you think you've learnt on her course that's helped you move forward so quickly?

I know you used to create videos anyway, but do you think what you've been taught has really made the ones you've produced now more effective?

Barry: Yes, absolutely.

With Learn With Sally I've learnt something in every module. Even Blogging Superstar which it started with installing a blog and buying a domain, setting up your emails.

When I first looked at the module, I thought "what am I gonna learn now?". I've been blogging for a few years and I was amazed at what I'd learnt.

Just simple things like bookmarking which was an oversight on my part, I hadn't been doing that and then moving through each module I was learning more and more.

I checked my traffic stats this morning and now normally my Twitter is my number 1 and then I get individual bloggers as 2, 3, 4 and 5, all the way up to 10.

But through Learn With Sally, I started on Facebook and Facebook then started appearing in my traffic.

When I checked my traffic this morning my number 1 was Stumble...

Jean: That's brilliant. So you automated the process presumably and that's what's made it so much easier for you?

Barry: Yes, absolutely.

I mean for You Tube to come in at number 4. I'd never seen You Tube in my top 10 prior to taking the Learn With Sally coaching.

Jean: So, obviously that's now the quality of your videos, not just the way that you produce them, but also the content as well presumably.

Barry: It's the content, the way I produce them and the way I work the video description now.

Because before I would just do a quick summary of what the video was about.

Now Sally has showed us how to research the keywords, enter the keywords and how to bulk up the description for the most benefits and it's certainly paying off.

Jean: Your videos, you certainly reflect your sense of humour, and you're quite a funny guy aren't you?

Barry: Yes, I do like to have fun.

Jean: Which is what it's all about really, isn't it, because some people take it really seriously. You can watch videos, and yes, they do tell you exactly what you need to do, but oh they're boring.

Barry: Yes. A little bit of humour goes a long way.

Jean: So the dog with the glasses, is that yours?

Barry: It is my dog, Yes! We had to have him put down a couple of years ago,

but I can't take him off my screen. He was such a good dog.

Jean: Obviously if he wore sunglasses.

Barry: That's my daughter playing with him.

Jean: He seems a very gentle dog anyway.

Barry: Yes, he was extremely.

Jean: So let's see you chartered your journey to success with some really interesting blog titles. Well they were good interesting blog posts but the titles were kind of interesting.

Passionate Focussed Thinking, what's that all about?

And then you've got:

- Develop Specific Goals To Attain Your Dreams
- Taking Action Learning As You Go
- Never Give Up, Focus And Hard Work
- Learn From Your Mistakes
- Back Up And Start Again.

Barry: Yes, that's the Journey to Success which is a blog carnival organized by Mandy Allen. Basically what it's about is finding your passion and following it through to success.

Jean: And your passion is internet marketing per-se, or is it helping newbies?

Because I notice that you call your blog Barry Wells.com - The Newbies Guide To Internet Marketing.

Barry: Yes, when I first started online I was sat in a bubble all on my own.

I didn't blog, I spent 6 months creating my first website and it was absolutely rubbish.

So what I aim to do now is pass back my knowledge to people that are starting out and hope to get them over the hurdles that I was stuck at for so long.

Jean: So do you intend then to continue along the internet marketing newbie scene or do you think now that you've acquired more skills that can be transferred into any niche, you might branch out to something else?

Barry: Yes, I'm thinking of branching out but I still want to encourage new people to start online and just follow their passions.

Jean: Have you ever thought about taking your online experiences offline to local business who are kind of struggling at the moment?

Barry: No, I haven't thought about that.

I have been looking at some internet marketing meet ups and I'm hoping to start attending some of those in the new year.

Making new contacts and branching out from there really.

Jean: Well, that's all possible. The thing is in a virtual world anything is possible, isn't it really?

Barry: It is yes, absolutely.

Jean: And the fact that we can communicate with people all over the world, because some of the people on the Learn With Sally course lived in Australia didn't they, and yet you could still chat to them.

It's amazing really how times have moved on.

Barry: It is extremely easy to start now.

Jean: Yes and the internet never stands still does it?

That's what scares a lot of people, especially in the beginning. Maybe they struggle to learn something, and no sooner have they learnt it than it's all changed.

Facebook, seems to change every week.

Barry: It does yes.

I'm fairly new to Facebook. I only stated it through the Learn With Sally coaching and since starting it they've already changed so much.

Jean: I must admit I have a presence on Facebook, but I rarely ever go on it and I don't really know how to use it properly.

Well, I do actually, because I've listened to Sally, but I don't, because a lot of the things at the moment are time consuming, and I haven't had a lot of time lately. Just like you for a while you didn't, - with your mother.

Building relationships is time consuming isn't it, and it's something you have to work on for a long time, which is how it should be.

Barry: Yes that's exactly right.

Since I've been blogging, to start with blogging was a side part of my coursework with the Master Class.

It was more about creating a product, so I would just go on the blog every now and again.

And then I had an operation myself and I was on bed rest for quite a long time.

During that time all I done was blog, because I couldn't sit up for too long. So actually sitting there typing to create my product was a No, No!

Then I was explaining this through my blog posts and people were coming at me with support and sympathy.

I don't really look for sympathy but I got a lot of support there and that was where my passion for blogging really started kicking in because of the relationships that were built up through it.

Jean: I think it often surprises you who actually reads your blog posts, not just yours.

You put something up there and you think "I don't know if anybody is going to read this", but it doesn't really matter.

If you write from the heart, and what you feel is true, then if you feel that you're helping somebody then it doesn't really matter who reads it, does it?

Barry: No, that's right. That's absolutely right.

Jean: And all your blog posts are very helpful in many, many ways.

Not just for the newbies but even for the people that have been on for quite a while.

You're very articulate.

Barry: Thank you.

Jean: You're welcome.

Barry: I just try to spread the word and help as many as I can.

What I also like to do is when I find a little gem online, I like to bring it back to my blog and detail it, and just say to people, "Wow look at what I've found - if this is any good to you, follow this link and this is where you'll find it".

For example Sally created a video on creating eBook covers and it was so helpful to me, being a product creator, that I thought "Wow, that's going to help so many people".

So I posted about it, and it wasn't a great post it was just rather than spend your money here, have a look at this and see if you can do it yourself.

And that drove Sally so much traffic that the following month I was featured in her video, which brought me back more traffic for me.

Jean: They say, what goes around, comes around, don't they?

Barry: Yes, and that's absolutely true as well.

Jean: So do you create all your graphics and things or do you outsource?

Barry: I outsource most of my graphics.

On the product I'm doing now, I had a template and I changed the template about, but normally I would outsource the graphics.

Because I find it too time consuming, and you can always nit-pick, and you're not happy with this and you're not happy with that.

And before you know it you've wasted a week.

Jean: So do you use Fiverr a lot?

Barry: Occasionally, I haven't used them for any graphics as yet, because I'm so happy with GFX that I use them all the time.

I'll give you a for instance.

I recently bought a new header for my blog and earlier this week I got in touch with Steve who created it, and asked him how much it would cost me for the exact same header but with no text on it.

So I could change the text as and when I suit. He sent me back an email with an attachment and it was the header.

Jean: Really?

Barry: Free of charge, - Yes! It's an excellent service.

Jean: Great, so we'll have to remember that one. So what do you think the future is for you then, where do you think you're going?

Barry: What I would like to do, I've got a product coming up soon, which I won't say too much about at the moment, but again it's helping people get started.

Then I've got an interview that I'm carrying out. That's going to be a free product, and then I've got 2 or 3 more products in mind, all of which are going to be free.

And then once I've done that, I would maybe do a little coaching course with perhaps 5 or 10 students, and just show them what I can do , and show them what they can do, and then at the end ask for their feedback and then I may expand it

Jean: Would you do that on your own, or would you be looking for a joint venture partner, somebody that you got on well with? Or, are you confident in relaying everything yourself?

Barry: I'm fairly confident that I can do it, but I'd want to do it with a small group so that they can progress, pretty much like the Learn With Sally.

She had 25 students; I'd aim for half that amount just to get some feedback. It would all be free, and it would be like a test to see if I'm up to it.

I believe I'm up to it, but again it's a little confidence thing, and if people say, "Yep, that was good and I'm now online and up and running", then I may go into it full time.

Jean: Okay, well maybe you should start with your daughter then.

Barry: Yes.

Jean: Get her those university fees.

Barry: Yeah, she's nineteen and working part time for a little bit of money in her pocket, and she likes to go out.

Jean: Well they all do don't they at that age, and why not?

Well Barry, thanks very much for your time. I hope you've enjoyed sharing your story.

Barry: I have Jean - Yes.

Jean: I'm sure it's inspired others to take a leap of faith, even if the push they get isn't quite as dramatic as yours, and hopefully it won't be.

So where can people find you?

Barry: Barry-Wells.com.

Jean: I noticed that you've got Barry (hyphen) Wells. Is that because your domain name wasn't available at the time?

Barry: Yes, that's correct.

Jean: It is now. Did you know that?

Barry: I didn't, - No.

Jean: Obviously doing a bit of research on you, I did type BarryWells.com without the hyphen and it came up and said this one is for sale.

So you might be interested, I don't know.

Barry: Possibly. At the time when I looked, they was asking an extortionate price and it was a company bulk buy, I believe and they were putting it out to tender.

Jean: Well, it may well still be the case. I don't know. I didn't look into it. It just came up and I thought, "Oh, I wonder if Barry knows this?"

So to re-iterate then, for anybody who's listening, and wants to see how well Barry has progressed, and maybe get on to his coaching program ,which he says will be free - initially anyway, it's Barry-Wells.com

Barry: That's correct Jean.

Jean: Okay, well you take care and enjoy the rest of your day.

Barry: And you.

Jean: Okay, bye.
